Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her role to safeguard and protect the children she minds. She has a suitable understanding of the signs and symptoms of abuse and knows the procedures to follow should she have any concerns about a child.
- The childminder understands how to provide appropriate activities and resources for children of different ages, abilities and backgrounds, to motivate and help them progress. She knows how to use observation and assessment of children's progress to help plan for the next steps in their learning.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how to assess children's progress, including the required progress check for two-year-olds, and knows how to help to prepare children for school.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and others to promote a consistent approach. She aims to provide parents with daily information that helps them understand their child's day and continue the learning at home.
- The childminder has effective systems to keep children safe. She understands the need to carry out risk assessments when going on outings and can identify appropriate steps in order to manage and minimise risks, including in her home.
- The childminder recognises the importance of using self-evaluation to reflect on the quality of her practice and provision to drive continuous improvements that benefit children.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed the areas of the childminder's house and garden that she plans to use for the care of children.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about her knowledge of the Early Years Foundation Stage, including her understanding of the progress check for children aged between two and three years.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she plans to deliver the learning and development requirements.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her self-evaluation and improvement plan.
- The inspector looked at relevant documents and discussed the policies and documents the childminder intends to use when caring for children, including arrangements for meeting safeguarding requirements and ways of working with parents.
