Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder is experienced and has a good understanding of how children learn and develop. She is passionate about providing high-quality care and education to all children. She keeps herself up to date with changes in legislation and seeks regular training courses to professionally develop herself.
- The childminder explains how she will constantly reflect on her practice. She will seek the views of parents and children regarding the service she provides, and has a positive attitude to change. The childminder intends to set herself challenging but achievable targets to drive her practice forward.
- Arrangements for safeguarding are effective. The childminder has a comprehensive understanding of the different types of abuse, and how to recognise the signs and symptoms of these. In addition, the childminder will risk assesses her premises and ensure that the environment is safe for children to play and learn in.
- The childminder intends to have systems in place to plan for, and assess children's individual needs and stage of development. Monitoring of children's progress will be in place, and the childminder explains how she will deliver a broad and balanced curriculum to support them to be ready for school.
- The childminder explains how she is dedicated to creating strong partnerships with parents. She will share children's learning with them regularly and keep them updated about their progress. In addition, the childminder understands the importance of working with other professionals to support all children to make the best possible progress.
- The childminder has a current paediatric first-aid qualification and valid insurance.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the premises and viewed all areas that are used when caring for children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to support children's play and learning.
- The inspector looked at qualification certificates and documents the childminder will use when caring for children.
- The inspector checked evidence of the suitability of household members, and talked with the childminder about her self-evaluation and improvement plans.
