Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder is aware of the signs of abuse and neglect. She understands how to promote children's safety and whom to contact in the event of a concern about a child's welfare.
- The childminder knows how to provide enjoyable learning experiences to help children make progress. She has a wide range of toys and resources available.
- The childminder knows how to work in partnership with parents and involve them in their child's learning. She demonstrates how she will observe and assess children's learning and monitor their progress.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's health. She knows how to provide children with nutritious meals and snacks, and opportunities to spend time outdoors.
- The childminder understands how to help children learn about good behaviour. She knows how to support children to respect and value others.
- The childminder understands how to review and reflect on her practice, and identify areas to improve.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The childminder registered in 2000 and lives in the Rubery area of Birmingham. She operates Monday to Friday from 7am until 6.30pm, all year round, except for bank holidays and family holidays. The childminder holds a recognised childcare qualification at level 3. She provides funded early education for two-, three- and four-year-old children.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
