Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands what documents she must maintain in order to promote children's health and keep them safe. This includes logging the times of children's attendance and the procedures to follow regarding accidents and medication.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents to exchange information about children to support their development and learning.
- The childminder understands the importance of encouraging children to learn about making healthy choices. This includes promoting effective hygiene routines, being physically active and learning about healthy food choices.
- The childminder provides a good range of books for children to choose from. She understands the importance of including children in story time to increase opportunities for them to hear and use words to develop their own vocabulary.
- The childminder monitors the quality of her service effectively. She completes regular training to update her knowledge and skills. This helps her to make continuous improvement.
- The childminder provides children with a range of activities that promote their learning and development in her home and the wider community.
- The childminder knows the possible signs that a child is at risk of harm, including if they were exposed to extreme views. The childminder explains the procedures she would follow if there were an allegation made against herself or another household member.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
