Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to provide a broad and balanced curriculum to help children learn. He assesses children's progress and uses this information to identify their current stage of development and plan for their next steps in learning.
- The childminder shares how he would help children to maintain good health. He explains how he plans to speak with parents and children about the benefits of nutritious food and help children to implement hygiene routines, such as frequent handwashing. The childminder would encourage children to exercise and play in fresh air daily.
- The childminder knows how to promote positive behaviour, including helping children to manage their own feelings and to be considerate towards others.
- The childminder recognises the importance of building effective partnerships. He explains how he would work effectively with parents and other professionals to ensure that children progress well. The childminder knows where to seek advice and support if there are persistent gaps in children's learning.
- The childminder completes training to update his safeguarding knowledge. He understands what action to take if a child is at risk of abuse or neglect, including if an allegation is made about himself or his co-childminder. The childminder explains how he will implement procedures to help keep children safe, such as risk assessments. He knows how to respond in a medical emergency.
- The childminder is reflective of his practice. He discusses that he would have regular discussions with his co-childminder, to help to identify his strengths and targets for improvement. He is keen to complete relevant training and research to extend his skills and knowledge in order to enhance his teaching practice.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- This was the first routine inspection the childminder received since the COVID-19 pandemic began. The inspector discussed the impact of the pandemic with the provider and has taken that into account in their evaluation of the childminder.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about his childcare practices throughout the inspection to establish his understanding of how to safeguard children.
- The inspector saw the areas of the childminder's home intended for childminding purposes. He checked the suitability of toys and resources available and discussed with the childminder how he monitors children's learning and development.
- The inspector sampled a range of relevant documentation, including the childminder's public liability insurance and training certificates.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
