Monitoring visit

Inspected under the social care common inspection framework

Information about this children's home

This home registered with Ofsted in August 2020 and is operated by a private company. It provides care for up to two children who experience social and emotional difficulties and have learning difficulties.

The posts for a registered manager and a responsible individual are vacant.

At the time of the visit, the home was subject to a suspension of accommodation notice, and no children were living at the home.

This monitoring visit

A full inspection was carried out on 17 April 2025. During the inspection, inspectors identified serious and widespread concerns in relation to the care and protection of children and the leadership and management of the home.

Following the full inspection, Ofsted decided to immediately suspend accommodation at the home under section 14A of the Care Standards Act 2000.

This visit was carried out to monitor the suspension notice. The inspector found that the provider has complied with the notice. A monitoring visit took place on 25 June 2025, and it was determined that insufficient action had been taken to address all the shortfalls identified at the full inspection. A further monitoring visit was required.

Since the last visit, the new manager in post has carried out supervision sessions with all staff. These have reflected on the shortfalls identified at the full inspection, focused on safeguarding, and identified actions to improve the care provided to children. They have also been used as a development opportunity for staff.

The manager has held team meetings, which have been well attended by staff. These have complemented the work carried out in one-to-one supervision sessions and have supported staff in working together to reflect on the shortfalls identified at the full inspection.

Staff have received training in safeguarding, restraint and de-escalation, and recording and reporting.

A case review was held following this visit. The period of suspension has now ended. The requirements were not considered at this visit and will be reviewed at the next inspection.

What does the children's home need to do to improve?

Statutory requirements

The protection of children standard is that children are protected from harm and enabled to keep themselves safe. In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure— that staff— assess whether each child is at risk of harm, taking into account information in the child's relevant plans, and, if necessary, make arrangements to reduce the risk of any harm to the child; have the skills to identify and act upon signs that a child is at risk of harm; understand the roles and responsibilities in relation to protecting children that are assigned to them by the registered person; take effective action whenever there is a serious concern about a child's welfare; and that the home's day-to-day care is arranged and delivered so as to keep each child safe and to protect each child effectively from harm. (Regulation 12 (1) (2)(a)(i)(ii)(iii)(iv)(v)(vi)) This requirement is restated.	30 May 2025
The leadership and management standard is that the registered person enables, inspires and leads a culture in relation to the children's home that— helps children aspire to fulfil their potential; and promotes their welfare.	30 May 2025

In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to— ensure that staff have the experience, qualifications and skills to meet the needs of each child. (Regulation 13 (1)(a)(b) (2)(c)) In particular, the registered person must ensure that staff are suitably experienced and competent to work with children and are given responsibilities in line with their experience. This also includes ensuring that there is adequate staffing to fulfil the requirements of the children’s placement plans and court-directed orders. This requirement is restated.	
The registered person must ensure that all employees— receive practice-related supervision by a person with appropriate experience; and have their performance and fitness to perform their roles appraised at least once every year. (Regulation 33 (4)(b)(c)) This requirement is restated.	30 May 2025
The quality and purpose of care standard is that children receive care from staff who— understand the children’s home s overall aims and the outcomes it seeks to achieve for children; use this understanding to deliver care that meets children’s needs and supports them to fulfil their potential. In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to— ensure that the premises used for the purposes of the home are designed and furnished so as to— meet the needs of each child; and enable each child to participate in the daily life of the home. (Regulation 6 (1)(a)(b) (2)(c)(i)(ii))	30 May 2025

In particular, this relates to the registered person ensuring that the home is maintained to a high standard and any damage or maintenance issues are identified and rectified in a timely manner. This requirement is restated.	
The registered person must prepare and implement a policy ("the behaviour management policy") which sets out— how appropriate behaviour is to be promoted in the children's home; and the measures of control, discipline and restraint which may be used in relation to children in the home. The registered person must keep the behaviour management policy under review and, where appropriate, revise it. The registered person must ensure that— within 24 hours of the use of a measure of control, discipline or restraint in relation to a child in the home, a record is made which includes— the name of the child; details of the child's behaviour leading to the use of the measure; the date, time and location of the use of the measure; a description of the measure and its duration; details of any methods used or steps taken to avoid the need to use the measure; the name of the person who used the measure ("the user"), and of any other person present when the measure was used; the effectiveness and any consequences of the use of the measure; and a description of any injury to the child or any other person, and any medical treatment administered, as a result of the measure;	30 May 2025

within 48 hours of the use of the measure, the registered person, or a person who is authorised by the registered person to do so ("the authorised person")— has spoken to the user about the measure; and has signed the record to confirm it is accurate; and within 5 days of the use of the measure, the registered person or the authorised person adds to the record confirmation that they have spoken to the child about the measure. (Regulation 35 (1)(a)(b) (2) (3)(a)(i)(ii)(iii)(iv)(v)(vi)(vii)(viii)(b)(i)(ii)(c))	
The care planning standard is that children— receive effectively planned care in or through the children's home; and have a positive experience of arriving at or moving on from the home. In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure— that arrangements are in place to— ensure the effective induction of each child into the home; manage and review the placement of each child in the home; and that each child's relevant plans are followed; that staff help each child to access and contribute to the records kept by the registered person in relation to the child. (Regulation 14 (1)(a)(b) (2)(b)(i)(ii)(c)(f)) This requirement is restated.	30 May 2025
The children's views, wishes and feelings standard is that children receive care from staff who— develop positive relationships with them;	30 May 2025

engage with them; and take their views, wishes and feelings into account in relation to matters affecting the children's care and welfare and their lives. (Regulation 7 (1)(a)(b)(c))	
The education standard is that children make measurable progress towards achieving their educational potential and are helped to do so. In particular, the standard in paragraph (1) requires the registered person to ensure— that staff— help each child to achieve the child's education and training targets, as recorded in the child's relevant plans; support each child's learning and development, including helping the child to develop independent study skills and, where appropriate, helping the child to complete independent study; understand the barriers to learning that each child may face and take appropriate action to help the child to overcome any such barriers. (Regulation 8 (1) (2)(a)(i)(ii)(iii))	30 May 2025
The health and well-being standard is that— the health and well-being needs of children are met; children receive advice, services and support in relation to their health and well-being; and children are helped to lead healthy lifestyles. (Regulation 10 (1)(a)(b)(c))	30 May 2025
The registered person must recruit staff using recruitment procedures that are designed to ensure children's safety. The registered person may only— employ an individual to work at the children's home; or if an individual is employed by a person other than the registered person to work at the home in a position in which the individual may have regular contact with children, allow that individual to work at the home, if the individual satisfies the requirements in paragraph (3).	30 May 2025

The requirements are that— the individual is of integrity and good character; the individual has the appropriate experience, qualification and skills for the work that the individual is to perform; and full and satisfactory information is available in relation to the individual in respect of each of the matters in Schedule 2. (Regulation 32 (1) (2)(a)(b) (3)(a)(b)(d))	
The registered person must maintain records ("case records") for each child which— include the information and documents listed in Schedule 3 in relation to each child; are kept up to date: and are signed and dated by the author of each entry. (Regulation 36 (1)(a)(b)(c))	30 May 2025
Schedule 4 sets out the other information that the registered person must keep in relation to a children's home. The registered person must— maintain in the home the records in Schedule 4; and ensure that the records are kept up to date. (Regulation 37 (1) (2)(a)(b)) In particular, ensure that the records include a copy of the staff duty rota, a record of the actual hours worked, and a record of any person who works at the home at any time, including managers who cover shifts.	30 May 2025
The independent person must produce a report about a visit ("the independent person's report") which sets out, in particular, the independent person's opinion as to whether— children are effectively safeguarded; and the conduct of the home promotes children's well-being. (Regulation 44 (4)(a)(b))	30 May 2025

In particular, the independent visitor report should provide a clear statement of opinion and a robust evaluation of practice in the home.
