Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a clear understanding of how children learn. She knows how to plan a curriculum that reflects the individual needs of children, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities. She explains in detail how she assesses children's learning, so that they make progress in their development.
- The childminder describes how she provides an inclusive service, so that all cultures and beliefs are valued and respected. She demonstrates a secure knowledge of how to support children's communication and language, including for those who speak English as an additional language.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents. She describes how she shares information with them to ensure consistency in meeting children's individual needs.
- The childminder has high expectations of children's behaviour. She recognises the importance of giving children clear boundaries and positive praise, so that they develop confidence and have high self-esteem.
- The childminder describes how she promotes children's physical, emotional well-being, and health. She understands the importance of children being physically active and provides regular opportunities for them to play outdoors.
- The childminder demonstrates a secure understanding of how to keep children safe. She describes how she keeps her premises safe and knows how to report concerns about children's welfare.
- The childminder explains how she keeps her professional development up to date to ensure children's overall health, safety and well-being. She attends regular training, which includes first aid and safeguarding.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
