Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has, through discussion, a secure knowledge of safeguarding procedures and practices and of how she will keep children safe. She has attended several sessions of safeguarding training to further develop her knowledge in this area.
- The childminder shows how she will provide learning opportunities for children through play and small-group interactions, that enable them to concentrate and engage with their learning. The childminder describes how she will make various resources available to children, including books, games, puzzles, mark and craft-making facilities and role-play toys.
- The childminder demonstrates, through discussion, how she will support children's behaviour and attitudes to others by promoting and encouraging kindness, respect and manners towards each other.
- Through discussion, the childminder explained how she will support children's independence skills by encouraging independent choice of resources and activities.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnerships with parents and other settings, to provide continuity for children's learning and well-being. She has good links with the local primary school and keeps herself updated on their curriculum topics and themes. This helps her adapt her activities so that children's learning is fully supported and firmly in place.
- The childminder shows, through discussion, how she will support working parents with their children's learning. This is by providing the children with opportunities to complete homework while in her setting.
- The childminder recognises the importance of healthy eating and describes how she will provide the children with home-made hot meals for tea, during after-school sessions.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
