Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands how to teach children about difference. For example, the childminder provides books and resources that reflect different cultures, skin tones and hair types. She will teach children about special religious or cultural events to support their understanding of, and respect for, difference. The childminder will value each child highly.
- The childminder understands how to manage children's behaviour in effective ways. She will share her high expectations with children, such as to be kind and to share with others. The childminder will give children time to calm down and help them to find more positive ways to behave if needed.
- The childminder talked about how she will provide activities that support children's good progress in all areas of learning. She will promote children's communication, language and literacy skills by talking to children as they play and while out on trips. She will take children to the local library for song and story-time sessions and provide books for children's use.
- The childminder understands how to seek appropriate support to care for children with special educational needs and/or disabilities. She knows how to monitor children regularly and to act promptly to close any gaps in learning.
- The childminder knows how to work with parents to promote the best outcomes for children. For example, she will discuss children's progress and activities each day with parents. The childminder will work closely in partnership with parents to support children's development in different areas, such as behaviour management.
- The childminder knows the importance of evaluating her work regularly to set suitable goals for improvement. She is keen to keep her skills and knowledge up to date and attends regular safeguarding and first-aid training updates.
- The childminder understands how to provide nutritious meals and snacks for children. She explained how she will support children's physical development by visiting the park to give children opportunities to climb, jump and run. She will provide space and resources to support babies' crawling and walking skills.
- The childminder has suitable documentation and insurance cover in place.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's independence skills, for instance, she will teach them how to put on their coats and shoes.
- The childminder will teach children about number by counting everyday objects, such as pegs, and help them to recognise numerals. She will teach children the names of different shapes and provide puzzles for them to complete.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed the premises, toys and resources with the childminder. She talked with the childminder about how she will use these to promote children's learning.
- The inspector viewed relevant documentation, which included the childminder's paediatric first-aid qualification, insurance and Disclosure and Barring Service checks for adults living in the home.
- The childminder explained to the inspector how she would use activities and experiences to support children's learning and development.
- The inspector talked with the childminder about her safeguarding knowledge and how she will keep children safe.
