Inspection judgements

Overall experiences and progress of children and young people: outstanding

The home is welcoming and maintained to a high standard throughout. There is a family atmosphere which helps children feel comfortable, safe and valued. The home is highly personalised throughout, with photographs showing the child enjoying a wide range of experiences and activities with staff. This helps the child build a sense of belonging. The child's bedroom is personalised, and the child's sense of identity comes through. The investment made by the child in personalising their space is a clear indicator they feel secure and settled.

Staff offer exceptional care to the child. They consistently provide high-quality, nurturing care which is tailored to the child's individual needs. Staff help the child and show compassion. This has helped the child to establish meaningful relationships. The child is learning how to trust adults through experiencing care from staff who do not give up on them. There have been times of high distress for the child and staff have shown resilience throughout, which is commendable.

The care planning for this child is exceptional. Practice is informed by research into the child's specific needs, which provides the child with the personalised approach required. The manager ensures specialist services are available to the child and supports the child to meaningfully engage with these services.

The child has highly complex mental health needs and fluctuating high-risk behaviours. Since the last inspection, the child has had several lengthy hospital admissions. Despite these significant challenges, staff have remained highly committed to the child's care and well-being. They have gone above and beyond to create opportunities for the child to develop positive and lasting memories. One example was arranging a sleepover at the home with a close relative who is important to the child. Staff travelled across the county to support this, showing dedication and creativity in meeting the child's needs. This helped promote the child's sense of identity and connection, which had a positive impact on their emotional well-being.

Staff understand the complexities in relation to the barriers around the child accessing education. The manager has worked closely with relevant professionals to support the child's educational needs. Since the last inspection, there have been times when the child has been engaged in education. This has included engaging with a tutor at times, which is significant progress. The manager and staff have high aspirations for the child and work with relevant agencies to ensure the right plans are in place.

The child has made progress in the last year. Independence is a trigger for the child; staff work with the child in a trauma-informed way and support them in subtle and skilful ways. External professionals commented on the progress the child has made in their independence skills.

How well children and young people are helped and protected: outstanding

The manager and staff have been required to manage a considerable level of risk. The level of risk and responses required from staff to ensure the child is safe have been constantly changing and have required a dynamic response. The manager and staff have worked above and beyond to prevent the child coming to harm. External professionals said that the positive, trusting relationships the child has with staff allow staff to clearly recognise, better than anyone, when the risk is escalating. The manager takes a 'shared risk' approach, which ensures all relevant agencies are involved in the meticulous risk management for the child.

The manager participates in regular multi-agency meetings to safeguard the child. She regularly consults with the child's psychologist when reviewing safety planning, to support the child to take risks in line with their development.

The manager and staff are working closely with the child's psychologist and outreach worker, who have commended the level of risk which the manager and staff are supporting this child with. The child's psychologist said the manager and staff have helped the child feel safe and provided consistency.

Staff care deeply for the child, and this is reflected in their responses when the child has been missing from home. There is excellent communication between the manager and relevant professionals to ensure the child returns home safely. Staff actively search for the child and there are meaningful discussions when the child returns, to explore how episodes of going missing can be avoided in future.

The manager and staff use their skills and experience to support the child with difficult feelings. They use trauma-informed research to achieve this. This has created a sense of safety for the child. There have been two incidents of physical intervention since the last inspection. When this has been used, it has been necessary and proportionate, and the records are detailed and reflective.

The effectiveness of leaders and managers: outstanding

The manager is impressive. She is dedicated to the child in her care and is determined to continue to help the child make positive progress. The manager has high aspirations for the child and has consistently shown care and compassion. She is supported by a competent deputy manager.

The manager is an exceptional role model to her staff team and is valued by them. She inspires the staff to provide the very best care. She is open and transparent, which helps create an open culture in the home. The manager is reflective and there are regular team discussions, also involving relevant agencies, which encourage staff to constantly evaluate the effectiveness of their interventions. The team is always looking for ways to improve the outcomes for the child they are caring for.

Staff are exceptionally well supported and understand the importance of creating a safe and trusting environment in which children can thrive. This is clear in the way the team has managed the child's selective mutism. While the child has had some difficulty communicating with some external professionals, they engage confidently with the staff team. This progress is a direct result of the staff's consistent care, strong relationships and the emotionally secure environment which has been created in the home.

External professionals consistently commend the team's positive impact on the child's development. The manager ensures that staff are reflective, receive high-quality supervision and have a strong understanding of the child's needs and how best to meet them. This creates a culture of high expectation, accountability and continual development, which leads to staff feeling more confident in helping the child make progress.

External professionals speak very highly of the manager and say her communication is excellent. One professional commented that the manager and staff are 'the best team' they have ever worked with and that they go 'above and beyond' for the child.

No requirements or recommendations have been made.
