Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder describes how she will plan an exciting curriculum that builds on children's prior learning. She is aware of how to ensure that children have activities that interest and engage them. The childminder knows how to adapt activities to meet the needs of children at different stages of development. She has procedures in place to monitor children's progress, and discusses how these enable her to plan for their next steps in learning.
- Children's safety is a priority for the childminder. She knows about the signs that may indicate that a child is at risk of harm at home and in the wider community. The childminder has clear procedures to follow if she is concerned about a child's welfare and understands how to report any allegations against herself. The childminder plans to carry out regular checks of her home and to remain vigilant for any hazards to ensure children's safety while in her care.
- The childminder describes how she will support children's good behaviour and teach them important social skills. For instance, she will explain the rules and boundaries in her home and teach children to be kind and friendly towards others. The childminder explains how she will foster children's positive attitudes to learning, such as by providing activities based around their individual interests.
- The childminder discusses the benefits of maintaining good partnerships with parents, carers and other professionals. She explains how she will share information with them about children's care and learning. The childminder talks about providing a consistent and shared approach to help all children to make the best progress that they can.
- Promoting children's good health is important to the childminder. She discusses the importance of teaching children how to keep themselves safe and healthy. The childminder plans to give children plenty of opportunities for fresh air and exercise, such as visits to a local park. The childminder explains how she will promote healthy attitudes to good nutrition through providing a balanced diet for children.
- The childminder demonstrates that she creates an inclusive environment. She understands how to support children with special educational needs and/or disabilities. The childminder discusses how she will make sure that every child could access her provision and enjoy the experiences she offers.
- The childminder demonstrates how she will support children's communication and language development. For example, she explains that books, songs and poems will play a big part in her curriculum.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
