Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder showed the inspector around the parts of her home she uses for childminding. She showed the inspector the resources she uses to support children's learning and development.
- The childminder showed the inspector a range of documentation, including those relating to suitability.
- The childminder can demonstrate her knowledge of how children learn. She can describe how she would plan a curriculum that reflects the individual needs of children and how she would undertake observation, assessment and planning.
- The childminder has a clear understanding of how to safeguard children. She has a good knowledge of safeguarding procedures and knows how to report concerns about children's welfare. She can explain the risk assessment procedures she would have in place for her premises and how she would maintain an accurate register of children's attendance.
- The childminder demonstrates a secure understanding of how she would promote children's health. She explains how she would provide daily opportunities for children to take part in outdoor activities to support their physical development.
- The inspector discussed the safeguarding and welfare requirements with the childminder and took account of evidence of suitability for persons living in the household.
- The inspector spoke to the childminder about her policies and procedures and viewed documentation that she will use when caring for children.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents. She explains that she would share information with parents about their child's progress to ensure continuity of care.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
