Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder explained how she will observe and assess children's progress. She understands how to use this information to support children while taking into account their current interests.
- The childminder has a good understanding of the importance of working in partnership with parents. She has systems in place to gather information from parents before children start to help her to get to know children's routines. She will ensure parents are kept informed of their child's learning in a range of ways, including through social media.
- The childminder understands how to seek support from a range of other professionals to ensure she can access the correct support if necessary.
- The childminder understands how to support children's behaviour in a positive way, for example, through discussions. The childminder explains how this will be done in a way which is appropriate to each child's age and stage of development.
- The childminder understands the importance of settling-in processes to ensure children feel comfortable with the childminder before their parents leave them. She explains how these will be built up over time, in agreement with parents.
- The childminder understands how to support children in preparation for school. This includes supporting them with early writing and teaching them a range of self-care skills.
- The childminder explained how she will teach children about looking after their bodies and keeping healthy. This includes teaching children about oral hygiene.
- The childminder understands the importance of ensuring that children have a wide range of experiences and activities to develop their understanding of the world around them. This will include teaching children about diversity and understanding cultures and celebrations beyond their own.
- The childminder is keen to keep her skills and knowledge up to date. She has access to a range of other opportunities to develop her knowledge even further.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
