What is it like to attend this early years setting?

This provision does not meet requirements

The provider does not have a secure knowledge and understanding of the statutory framework for the early years foundation stage (EYFS). She does not ensure that all the requirements of registration are consistently met. The provider has not ensured that staff receive an effective induction to ensure that they confidently understand their roles and responsibilities. Essential records that are required for the safe and efficient running of the provision are not available. Consequently, children do not benefit from a high-quality provision that fully supports their safety. Nevertheless, children are happy and enjoy playing with their friends after school at the club.

On arrival, children chatter to each other as they place their coat and belongings in the designated space. They demonstrate positive relationships with the provider and staff who are kind and caring. Children are free to choose what they would like to play with from the available resources. However, these are somewhat limited which at times results in children being unsure of what to do and some boisterous behaviour. That said, children do show some interest in an art and craft activity. They use brushes and watercolour paints to create pictures. They are keen to share what they have painted with staff, who warmly acknowledge their achievements.

What does the early years setting do well and what does it need to do better?

- The provider has responded appropriately to the weaknesses identified at the last inspection and taken some positive action. For example, she ensures that the premises are secure and deploys staff appropriately to ensure that children are supervised, particularly when they are eating. However, the provider does not have a good enough knowledge and understanding of the EYFS and her responsibilities as a registered provider. Consequently, there are further breaches of requirements that compromise children's safety and impacts on the quality of their experiences at the club.
- The provider has employed staff to work alongside her. She provides new staff with some basic information and a general overview of the setting. However, induction procedures are not effective in ensuring that staff have a secure understanding of their responsibilities to help them to fulfil their role confidently and competently. Additionally, although the provider demonstrates an understanding of safeguarding and child protection procedures, staff are not effectively supported to understand these procedures as part of the induction process.
- The provider, following the last inspection, ensures that she maintains a record of children's attendance. However, all other essential records, including those in relation to staff suitability and children's records are neither available nor

accessible. This is a breach of the requirements. The provider has failed to consider the implications on children's safety and well-being by not having this information to hand when caring for children.

- Children are provided with a snack during the session and are encouraged to access their own water bottles. Children wash their hands before sitting at the table to eat. They sit and talk with each other and staff while they wait for snack to be served. However, the provision for snack is not well organised. Staff who have not completed the required food hygiene training are asked to prepare and serve snacks to children. The choice of snack is limited, and children have minimal opportunities to carry out tasks that they can do themselves.
- Children demonstrate positive relationships with each other. Overall, they play well together and enjoy initiating their own games. Children take it turns during a board game and share small-world resources. On the occasions when play becomes too boisterous or minor disputes occur, staff calmly intervene before situations escalate further.
- Partnership with parents is positive. The provider talks with parents when they collect their children. She shares relevant information, including any messages from school to support a consistent and complementary approach for children. Parents comment that they like the relaxed feel to the club. They comment that their children enjoy attending and playing with children of different ages.

Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are not effective.

There is not an open and positive culture around safeguarding that puts children's interests first.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

The provision is not meeting requirements and Ofsted intends to take enforcement action.
