Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows about safeguarding practices and the reporting procedures to follow if she has any welfare concerns.
- The childminder knows how to evaluate her provision to help to improve her practice and meet the needs of children.
- The childminder understands the learning and development requirements of the early years foundation stage. For example, she knows how to assess children's abilities and needs, and address any gaps in their learning to help them to progress.
- The childminder knows how to plan a broad range of activities to support children's learning and to help to prepare them for the next stages in their development.
- The childminder knows the value of working in partnership with parents, outside professionals and other early years providers, to help to ensure continuity and progression in children's learning and development.
- The childminder understands how to manage children's behaviour. She plans to help them to follow rules and boundaries and to respect each other's differences.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector viewed the areas of the premises where childcare is provided.
- The inspector had a discussion with the childminder about her knowledge and understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements of the early years foundation stage.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her documentation, including children's learning records, policies and procedures.
- The inspector checked evidence of suitability records and looked at the childminder's qualifications and training certificates.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to plan, provide learning experiences for children and undertake observations and assessments.
