Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her role and responsibility to effectively safeguard the children. She has a clear understanding of the procedure she will follow should she have a concern regarding a child's welfare.
- The childminder demonstrates a sound knowledge of how to promote children's independence and prepare them for the next stage in their learning, including school.
- The childminder understands the benefits of working in partnership with parents and other professionals. She explains how information will be shared to help ensure children's individual needs are met.
- The childminder understands how to positively manage children's behaviour. She has a good understanding of the importance of providing clear boundaries. Children know what is expected of them, both in the home and when out in the local community.
- The childminder demonstrates how she would monitor children's progress using observations and assessments. She discusses how she would use this information to plan the next steps in children's learning based on their interests.
- The childminder fully understands the importance of promoting children's health and well-being. She explains the importance of planning daily opportunities for outdoor play and involving children in outings within the local area, such as visiting the park.
- The childminder is committed to evaluating her practice to drive continued improvement. She has systems in place to gather detailed feedback from children and parents to help ensure that planned developments meet their needs.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector looked at and discussed a range of records with the childminder, including policies and procedures, evidence of qualifications and suitability of household members.
- The inspector viewed all areas accessed by children.
- The inspector spoke with the childminder about the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector had a discussion with the childminder about her knowledge and understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's methods for reviewing the quality and effectiveness of her provision.
