Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder provides a welcoming learning environment for children to play. She knows to carry out ongoing risk assessments to identify hazards and minimise risks to children. She understands the importance of providing children with regular fresh air, exercise and healthy food. She knows to teach children how to keep themselves safe.
- The childminder has a good knowledge and understanding of the learning and development requirements for children in the early years age group. She knows how she will gather information from parents regarding their child's starting points. The childminder is confident about how she will assess children's progress and use this information to plan a range of activities based around children's interests and next steps.
- The childminder recognises the importance of self evaluation and continued professional development to strengthen her knowledge and skills. She maintains her statutory training in first aid and safeguarding.
- The childminder knows the signs and symptoms that indicate a child may be at risk of abuse, neglect or being drawn into extreme behaviours or ideas. She is aware of the procedures to follow to report any concerns she has about a child's safety or welfare.
- The childminder understands the importance of working with parents, carers and other professionals. She is clear about sharing information with parents on a regular basis to help them to support their child's learning effectively at home.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the premises.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her knowledge and understanding of the requirements of the early years foundation stage.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her understanding of safeguarding procedures.
- The inspector checked the suitability of all relevant members of the household.
- The inspector viewed a range of documents, such as policies and risk assessments.

The childminder registered in 2002 and lives in Brandesburton on the outskirts of Beverley. She operates Monday to Friday from 7.30am to 5.30pm. She holds an appropriate early years qualification at level 3.
