Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands how to keep children safe in her home and when outdoors. She knows the signs where a child may be at risk of harm and she has procedures to follow to protect a child's welfare.
- The childminder has a range of strategies to encourage children's good behaviour and knows how to adapt these to their age and stage of development.
- The childminder understands the learning and development requirements. She knows how to plan activities, using appropriate toys and resources, to help children's learning in all areas.
- The childminder evaluates her service to improve. She maintains her paediatric first-aid certificate and has refreshed her understanding of how to safeguard children.
- The childminder knows how to support children's health and hygiene awareness. For example, she understands the benefits that nutritious meals and exercise have on children's health.
- The childminder understands the importance of sharing information with both parents and others involved with the children to help their learning and development.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the premises and checked all areas available for children's use.
- The inspector checked evidence of the childminder's qualifications and suitability, and sampled documentation, including the range of policies the childminder will use when caring for children.
- The inspector asked the childminder to discuss how she would meet the safeguarding and welfare, and learning and development needs of the children in her care.
