Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder keeps her skills and knowledge current. She has kept up to date with changes to requirements. She knows the need to regularly evaluate her practice to drive improvements for the children.
- The childminder understands her duty to safeguard children and protect them from harm. She has a safeguarding procedure and knows how to refer concerns.
- The childminder knows how to monitor and assess children's learning to support children to make progress. She offers a broad range of activities and resources to support children's learning and development.
- The childminder understands the importance of teaching children to learn to respect and value other peoples' opinions.
- The childminder understands how to meet children's needs in the event of an emergency or accident. She understands the importance of providing children with exercise and a healthy diet, including meeting their dietary needs.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents, carers and other professionals to provide continuity of care for children.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

- The inspector viewed all the areas of the childminder's home available for childminding.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's understanding, knowledge and procedures for safeguarding.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's understanding of the early years foundation stage requirements.
- The inspector discussed and reviewed a sample of relevant documents that the childminder uses for childminding.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she evaluates her practice.
