Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to use the information from her assessments to plan for children's next stage in learning, to help them make good progress.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents to provide a consistent approach. She knows the need to provide parents with regular feedback about children's progress and to support learning at home.
- The childminder understands the importance of evaluating her service. She reflects on ways to implement improvements to benefit children's care and learning.
- The childminder is aware of how to prepare children for their move to school or nursery. For example, she knows the importance of promoting their independence and personal care skills.
- The childminder understands how to offer an inclusive service, and help children learn to respect and value each other's differences.
- The childminder recognises how to help children develop and understanding of healthy lifestyle. She knows how to promote children's understanding of keeping themselves safe in an emergency and on outings.
- The childminder understands her responsibility to safeguard children and shares this with her assistant. She knows the signs that would cause her concern about a child's welfare and the processes to follow.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector checked the suitability and training of the childminder and the suitability of adults living on the premises.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about her knowledge and understanding of the safeguarding and welfare, and learning and development requirements.
- The inspector viewed the areas of the home that are used for childminding.
- The inspector viewed a sample of documentation, including the childminder's first-aid and public liability insurance certificate and policies and procedures.
