Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder is knowledgeable about her responsibilities to safeguard children. She knows the procedures to follow in the event of a child protection concern.
- The childminder understands the benefit of reflecting on the quality of her service, to continually make improvements and enhance the experiences she offers children.
- The childminder values the importance of developing effective partnerships with parents and other professionals involved in children's care, to provide consistency for children.
- The childminder understands how to observe and monitor children's development and plan for their individual learning needs. She knows how to help children make progress, in preparation for the next stage in their learning, including school.
- The childminder recognises how to support children's social and emotional well-being. She intends to be a positive role model, teaching children to respect and value others.
- The learning environment is welcoming, well planned and suitably resourced for children of various ages. The childminder understands how to ensure her home is safe and has systems in place to identify and minimise any potential hazards.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector spoke to the childminder about her practices and procedures, including how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector viewed the areas of the premises that are available for childminding and discussed safety arrangements.
- The inspector looked at samples of documentation and records that the childminder plans to use to support children's welfare and learning.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about her systems for self-evaluation.

The childminder registered in 2004. She lives in the London Borough of Camden. She operates Monday to Friday from 9am until 6pm, for most of the year. There were no children on roll at the time of inspection.
