Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder expresses her commitment to promoting her teaching skills and knowledge through ongoing professional development opportunities. She has completed training to ensure that her safeguarding knowledge is up to date. The childminder is aware of potential signs of abuse and what to do if there are concerns about children's welfare.
- The childminder describes how she will guide children's behaviour, including teaching them morals, empathy and social skills. Children will receive lots of reassurance and praise to boost their self-confidence.
- Partnership with parents will be encouraged in the setting. The childminder aims to obtain detailed information from parents about their children's starting points to assist her in planning children's next steps in learning. She wants to engage parents in their children's ongoing progress to ensure consistent care and education.
- The childminder plans to offer a variety of activities and learning experiences for children. She is especially focused on fostering children's love for books. A collection of books, including multilingual books, will be available to encourage children's understanding of different languages.
- The setting has a range of indoor and outdoor toys for children to access independently. These include musical instruments, soft toys and sensory toys that help foster children's curiosity and creativity. Additionally, children will have opportunities to visit parks and playgroups to enhance their learning.
- The childminder intends to evaluate the quality of the provision with the help of parents and other professionals. Since the last inspection, she has increased her knowledge of how to link children's interests to activities to keep them motivated to play.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
