Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has plans in place to deliver the curriculum to help children to acquire the knowledge and skills ready for the next stage in learning. She understands how to assess children's learning to identify what they know and can do when they first start to attend and throughout their time at the setting.
- The childminder evaluates her practice and identifies professional development to help to maintain her knowledge and skills. Since the last inspection, the childminder described how she has developed the curriculum in order to further support children's creative development. The childminder has also accessed training to help her to develop her understanding of how to adapt activities to meet the needs of different children.
- The childminder explained how she works with parents and the providers of other settings children attend to exchange information to help to promote continuity in children's care and learning.
- The childminder knows how to promote children's healthy lifestyles, including through activities. She has plans to teach children to clean their teeth and to get regular exercise through visits to the local park.
- The childminder plans activities to help to build on children's concentration and motivation to learn. She understands how to promote children's good behaviour and how to help children to learn about feelings and emotions.
- The childminder understands how to identify children with special educational needs and/or disabilities and obtain the support from other agencies that children might need to help them to receive timely support.
- The childminder has planned her curriculum to give children plentiful opportunities to develop and practise their communication, language and literacy skills.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
