Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her safeguarding responsibilities to help keep children safe from harm. She attends regular safeguarding training to help keep her knowledge up to date. She knows about a wide range of safeguarding issues that may affect children and families.
- The childminder describes her intent for the curriculum across all the areas of learning. She knows how to observe and assess children's progress and plan for their next steps in learning. She describes how she will support children to manage their behaviour and feelings.
- The childminder explains how she works in partnership with parents. For example, she talks about sharing information with parents, keeping them updated about their child's progress and any concerns she may have. She understands to work with external agencies to support children to make progress in their development.
- The childminder understands how to evaluate her practice. For instance, she has met the previous actions set at the last inspection. She undertakes mandatory training to support her professional development.
- The childminder describes how she will support children to develop independence to manage their own care needs. She explains that she will encourage children to eat healthy meals and take part in regular exercise outside.
- The childminder understands how to support children to learn about the wider world and respect others. For example, she describes how she will teach children about various festivals and offer children food from other cultures.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
