Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder updates her knowledge of safeguarding and child protection matters. She understands the procedures for referring any causes of concern and how to assess and minimise risks to children in her home and on outings.
- The childminder understands the importance of working, and exchanging information, with other professionals and parents about children's care and learning.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's well-being through healthy eating and, for example, planning daily physical play in her garden and at local parks.
- The childminder has a good range of toys and equipment. These are suitable for supporting the play and development of children in the early years age range.
- The childminder recognises the importance of reflecting on her practices and keeping her training and knowledge up to date.
- The childminder understands how to assess and track children's progress. She knows how to provide activities to help children to make progress, preparing them for school.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector checked evidence of the childminder's suitability and qualifications to work with children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her understanding and knowledge of safeguarding and how she would protect the children's welfare.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she plans to deliver the learning and development requirements.
- The inspector viewed the areas of the house and garden that the childminder normally uses for childminding.
- The inspector discussed with childminder how she would engage in partnership working with parents and other settings.
