Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- Since her last inspection, the childminder has reflected on her practice. She has undertaken research and training to help improve her knowledge of the learning and development requirements. For example, she has developed her understanding of how to support children's communication and language skills.
- The childminder understands how to use observations to plan activities to support children's progress and readiness for school. She knows how to organise the environment to help children make choices about their play and learning.
- The childminder understands her responsibilities to keep children safe, including assessing risks in her home and on outings. She knows how to recognise and respond to concerns about children's welfare.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents and other early years providers to support consistent care and learning for children.
- The childminder understands how to support children's positive behaviour, such as by modelling expected behaviour to them.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she plans to monitor children's learning and plan for their development.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her understanding of safeguarding children.
- The inspector looked at the areas of the home used for childminding and the equipment and resources available for children's play and learning.
- The inspector took account of the childminder's self-evaluation and how she has addressed the recommendations and actions from her previous inspection.
- The inspector sampled documentation, including written policies and procedures.
