Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder has not carried out appropriate suitability checks for all adults living in the home. This is also a breach of the Childcare Register requirements.
- The childminder does not hold a valid paediatric first-aid certificate. This is also a breach of the Childcare Register requirements.
- The childminder knows the signs and symptoms that would give cause for concern. She understands the procedure to follow to help protect children from harm.
- The childminder understands how children learn. She knows how to observe and monitor children's learning. She knows how to plan activities that are interesting to support children to make progress.
- The childminder understands the importance of helping children develop the skills they need to promote their future learning and move on to school.
- The childminder clearly understands how to support healthy lifestyles for children. She knows how to encourage children's physical well-being, such as through regular fresh air, exercise, healthy meals and cooking activities.
- The childminder understands the importance of working closely with parents and other settings children attend to provide continuity in their learning and development.
- The childminder knows how to evaluate her practice. She understands the importance of seeking the views of parents and children to help her identify areas for development.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further
