Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder ensures she keeps up to date with mandatory training, such as paediatric first aid and safeguarding. She confidently explains the strengths of the provision she offers. The childminder regularly researches and completes online training to help expand her knowledge and skills.
- The childminder describes how she will manage children's behaviour, describing how she will help them to resolve conflict for themselves. She has high expectations and understands the importance of supporting children to show good manners, build positive relationships and value each other's differences. She discusses the significance of enabling children to express and recognise their emotions, to help them manage their behaviour positively.
- The childminder discusses the benefits of taking children outdoors daily. She explains how this supports children's social development, physical well-being and helps to develop a wider awareness of their local community.
- The childminder explains how she gathers information about children's individual needs and spends time helping children to settle and feel comfortable when they first attend. She is committed to ensuring every child feels welcome and has a sense of belonging in her home.
- The childminder describes how she has well-established routines in place. She wants children to be independent. This includes putting away their belongings on arrival, washing their hands and settling down to the range of activities of their choice. The childminder explains that she prepares well-balanced, home-cooked meals for children's dinner.
- The childminder demonstrates that she provides an inclusive environment. She has a clear understanding of how to support children with special educational needs and/or disabilities. The childminder describes how she would ensure every child could access her provision and enjoy the experiences she provides.
- The childminder understands the importance of building trusted partnerships with parents. She describes how sharing ongoing updates with them and working closely together helps to provide children with levels of consistency across her setting, their home and other settings children may attend.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
