Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not meet the safeguarding and welfare requirements. She does not hold a current paediatric first-aid certificate or public liability insurance. These omissions also breach the requirements of the Childcare Register.
- The childminder understands the learning and development requirements and her role in promoting children's learning through assessing their development and planning for progress, so all children are ready for the next stage in learning.
- The childminder understands the need to provide a range of resources to interest and engage children in line with their different ages, backgrounds and stages of development.
- The childminder is aware of the importance of working with parents and other early years providers to meet children's individual physical and learning needs.
- The childminder knows how to identify and minimise risks in the environment.
- The childminder understands appropriate methods to promote children's good behaviour, teach them to respect others and to develop their independence.
- The childminder has a secure understanding of her role in child protection. She has the required policies and procedures to share with parents so they are aware of her responsibilities.
- The childminder understands the need to continue to develop her practice.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:
