Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- Since the last inspection, the childminder has completed a full paediatric first-aid training course. Through discussion she is able to demonstrate she has the knowledge she needs to respond appropriately if an accident were to happen to a child in her care.
- The childminder has a robust safeguarding knowledge. She attends regular training to keep this knowledge up to date. She is able to recognise and respond to the signs that may indicate a child is at risk of harm or abuse.
- The childminder is able to explain how she would plan and deliver a programme of learning suitable for young children. She understands how to carry out the required progress check for children aged between two and three years old.
- The childminder understands the importance of working closely with parents and other professionals to support children. She knows where to seek further support for children if needed.
- The childminder understands the importance of helping children follow a healthy lifestyle. She has identified local parks where she can take children for fresh air and exercise. She has considered the advice she can give to parents to encourage them to send children with healthy lunches.
- The childminder has appropriate knowledge of how to manage children's behaviour and help them to manage their emotions. She understands the importance of giving children clear and consistent messages about acceptable behaviour and lots of praise when they are helpful or considerate.
- The childminder is committed to continuing to keep her skills and knowledge up to date. She has identified further training to complete to enhance further her knowledge of how to support children's learning.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector looked at relevant documentation, including training certificates and evidence of the suitability of all adults living on the premises.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
