Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates that she will provide a wide range of experiences to support children in all areas of learning. She knows how to monitor and assess children's progress over time, to help identify the next stages in their learning.
- The childminder understands the importance of keeping children safe from harm. She knows the local reporting procedure to follow if she has a concern about a child's welfare. The childminder has a system to regularly assess risk in her home and prior to outings to minimise or remove potential hazards to children.
- The childminder recognises the importance of promoting children's good health. For example, she says she will provide children with freshly prepared home-cooked healthy meals, plenty of fresh fruit and daily opportunities for physical exercise.
- The childminder understands how to support children's behaviour. She knows how to encourage children to behave well and to value each other's differences, home experiences and beliefs.
- The childminder understands the benefits of working in partnership with parents. She has written procedures to share with parents that explain her practice. She understands the importance of working in partnership with other professionals to support a consistent approach.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of parts of the premises used for the purpose of childminding.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder her understanding of requirements and how she will support children's learning and care.
- The inspector viewed relevant documentation, including the childminder's public liability insurance, safeguarding policy and procedures, and paediatric first-aid qualification.

The childminder registered in 2008 and lives in Wallington, Surrey. She operates from Monday to Friday all year round.
