Summary of key findings

This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder has failed to complete a full and relevant paediatric first-aid course within the required time period of three years. She is not aware of all the matters that must be notified to Ofsted and the related timescales. These are breaches of the safeguarding and welfare requirements of the early years foundation stage.
- The childminder plans to offer a curriculum tailored to each child's individual needs, age and stage of development. She understands the importance of observing children's play to assess their development and support their learning. Additionally, the childminder is aware of the requirement to complete a written progress check for children aged between two to three years. She understands this is to identify if children are meeting their developmental milestones or if there are gaps in their learning.
- The childminder has a secure understanding of local safeguarding procedures to ensure that children who are at risk of, or experiencing, abuse receive timely support. She is aware of whom to contact if an allegation is made against her or any member of her household. The childminder knows who to contact if there are any signs that the children in her care may be at risk of abuse or neglect.
- The childminder recognises the benefits of allowing children to settle in gradually and introducing them to her care. She understands that this process supports children's emotional well-being. Additionally, the childminder values the importance of sharing information with parents and carers and other professionals about each child in her care, to promote continuity in their care and learning.
- The childminder explains how she encourages positive behaviour in children and addresses any undesirable behaviour effectively. For example, she explains how she will use simple house rules and encourage children to share, be kind and respectful. The childminder is also able to demonstrate how she supports children's independence as they prepare to transition to school. For example, she explains she will teach children to do things for themselves, such as dressing and undressing, putting on their shoes and feeding themselves.
- The childminder can clearly explain how she would evaluate her home for any potential risks to ensure that it is safe for children in her care. Additionally, the childminder outlines how she will promote children's good health by implementing hygiene routines and encouraging healthy eating habits. She understands the significance of providing children with opportunities to be physically active and access to fresh air.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What does the setting need to do to improve?

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and Childcare Register the provider must:
