Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not meet the safeguarding and welfare requirements. Her first-aid certificate has expired. This is also a breach of the Childcare Register requirements.
- The childminder knows how to undertake risk assessment to keep her home free from hazards to promote children's safety.
- The childminder knows the importance of protecting children's welfare. She understands that there are procedures to follow if she has concerns about a child.
- The childminder knows the need to promote children's good health, to minimise the spread of germs and to teach children about healthy lifestyles.
- The childminder understands the need to use observations and assessments to support children's learning and development. She knows how to provide activities to help children to progress in all areas in readiness for school.
- The childminder understands how to manage children's behaviour, and of the need to teach them to respect others.
- The childminder knows the importance of developing partnerships with parents to know, and be able to meet, children's physical needs.
- The childminder understands the importance of training in improving her practice.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
