Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder explains how he will support the learning and development of the children in his care. He describes how he will provide a range of interesting and engaging activities in line with the curriculum and children's interests.
- The childminder has very high expectations for children's behaviour. He explains how he intends to support children in developing relationships with others through positive interactions and creating a warm welcoming environment for them.
- The childminder has a thorough understanding of how to keep the children in his care safe. He knows how to recognise the signs and symptoms of abuse and how to refer these to the relevant authorities. The childminder understands the importance of promoting children's safety in his home to minimise the risk of accidents and injuries. He has appropriate policies and procedures in place to ensure children's safety.
- The childminder is reflective of his own professional development. He understands how to further enhance his learning, through relevant courses, training and working with other childminders.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working closely with parents. He knows how this is important to ensure continuity of care for children. The childminder explains that he will enhance this relationship through sharing photos and observations of children throughout the day.
- The childminder demonstrates a thorough understanding of supporting the development of children's confidence and independence through positive role modelling.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how he intends to support children's learning and development.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of those living in the premises.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how he intends to meet the safeguarding and welfare requirements when minding children.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about his methods and plans to develop his professional practice.

We carried out this inspection under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.

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
