Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder describes how she intends to work with parents from the start to gather information about children's learning. She explains how she plans to observe children and assess their development. She describes how she intends to use her knowledge of what children need to learn next to plan challenging activities.
- The childminder describes how she intends to reflect on her practice to develop action plans. She explains how this will help her to implement changes that benefit children.
- The childminder demonstrates a good knowledge of child protection. She is alert to the signs of abuse and knows the procedures to follow in the event of a concern arising. She describes how she would implement risk assessments to help to keep children safe.
- The childminder understands the importance of developing effective partnerships with parents and other professionals. She is aware of the agencies to report any concerns to regarding children's welfare.
- The childminder describes the importance of offering an inclusive setting. She intends to teach young children about similarities and differences between themselves and others.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to develop the educational programmes for children, including observing and assessing children's development.
- The inspector viewed the areas of the childminder's home intended for childminding purposes.
- The inspector viewed a range of documents, including a sample of policies and procedures and checked evidence of the suitability of adults living on the premises.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder regarding how she intends to meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage.
