Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals to support children's individual needs. She knows the procedures to follow should she need to seek additional support for children.
- The childminder has a robust understanding of her role in keeping children safe. She knows what to do should she be concerned about the safety or welfare of a child. The childminder knows the procedures to follow should an allegation be made against herself or a member of her household.
- The childminder understands the importance of providing children with a healthy diet and regular exercise to promote their physical and emotional well-being.
- The childminder demonstrates how she seeks the views of parents and children and uses this information to help her to identify future improvements to her service.
- The childminder demonstrates how she uses observations and assessments to effectively plan and support each child's learning and development needs.
- The childminder understands the importance of using a range of strategies to promote children's positive behaviour.
- The childminder understands how to create challenging activities and has a suitable range of resources to meet the learning needs of children.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector toured the areas of the home intended for the use of childminding.
- The inspector looked at a wide range of relevant documentation and evidence of the suitability of persons living in the household.
- The inspector took account of the views of parents through written feedback provided.
- The inspector held discussions about the childminder's understanding of how young children learn and how she intends to promote their learning and development.
