The quality and standards of the early years provision

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder is able to demonstrate how the environment and resources will provide challenge for children and engage their interest. The parts of the premises to be used for the care of children are welcoming. Resources are available to meet the needs of all children and are accessible to all.
- The childminder has a good knowledge of the learning and development requirements. She has considered how to plan for individual children's needs and understands why she should complete observational assessments and work in partnership with parents and others.
- The childminder has sufficient knowledge of child protection procedures approved by the Local Safeguarding Children Board. She fully understands her responsibility to protect the welfare of the child.
- The childminder has taken account of the past recommendations including to ensure she gains written permission to administer medicine to children, to attend first aid training and to keep a first aid kit. This will ensure the safety of children and demonstrates a good understanding of the requirements for childminding within the Statutory Framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage.
- Overall, the childminder understands how to promote children's health, safety and wellbeing. She knows how to work in partnership with parents and other professionals to meet children's care and learning needs and support their transitions.

Information about this inspection

Inspections of registered early years provision are:

- scheduled at least once in every inspection cycle – the current cycle ends on 31 July 2016
- scheduled more frequently where Ofsted identifies a need to do so, for example where provision was previously judged inadequate
- brought forward in the inspection cycle where Ofsted has received information that suggests the provision may not be meeting the legal requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage or where assessment of the provision identifies a need for early inspection
- prioritised where we have received information that the provision is not meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and which suggests children may not be safe
- scheduled at the completion of an investigation into failure to comply with the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage.

There were no children on roll when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children on roll, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

The provision is also registered on the compulsory part of the Childcare Register. This report includes a judgment about compliance with the requirements of that register.

Information about the setting

The childminder registered in 2009. She lives with her husband and two young children in Perivale, within the London Borough of Ealing. Children have access to the living room on the ground floor and the bathroom on the first floor. There is a secure garden for outdoor play. The childminder is registered on the Early Years Register and the compulsory part of the Childcare Register. The childminder has no children on roll.

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Type of provision

For the purposes of this inspection the following definitions apply:

Full-time provision is that which operates for more than three hours. These are usually known as nurseries, nursery schools and pre-schools and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the higher fee for registration.

Sessional provision operates for more than two hours but does not exceed three hours in any one day. These are usually known as pre-schools, kindergartens or nursery schools

and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. They are registered on the Early Years Register and pay the lower fee for registration.

Childminders care for one or more children where individual children attend for a period of more than two hours in any one day. They operate from domestic premises, which are usually the childminder's own home. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage.

Out of school provision may be sessional or full-time provision and is delivered before or after school and/or in the summer holidays. They are registered on the Early Years Register and must deliver the Early Years Foundation Stage. Where children receive their Early Years Foundation Stage in school these providers do not have to deliver the learning and development requirements in full but should complement the experiences children receive in school.

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
