Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder provides a wide variety of resources to support children's learning and development. She understands how to organise activities to support the needs of different groups of children.
- The childminder has systems in place to promote children's safety and welfare. For example, she teaches children how to manage risks during play in the outdoor environment.
- The childminder has comprehensive systems in place for sharing information with parents. This helps support children's individual care and learning needs in the setting and at home.
- The childminder understands how to promote children's well-being. She demonstrates an awareness of how to form secure attachments with children and develop their self-confidence. She also understands how to positively manage children's behaviour.
- The childminder has knowledge of child protection procedures and understands her responsibility to protect the welfare of children in her care. The childminder provides ongoing training for her assistants and ensures they are kept up to date with developments in safeguarding procedures.
- The childminder regularly reviews her provision and takes account of the views of parents and children. She is highly committed to professional development and carries out research to improve her understanding of children's specific needs. This demonstrates the childminder's capacity to improve and to develop the provision.
- The childminder understands how to prepare children for school or the next stage in their learning. She has established strong links with local primary schools.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the premises and viewed all areas that are used when caring for children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to support children's play and learning.
- The inspector looked at policies, procedures and documents the childminder will use when caring for children.
