Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her role and responsibility to safeguard children and promote their welfare. She knows how to identify and report any possible signs that may indicate a child's welfare is at risk of harm.
- The childminder understands the learning and development requirements. She knows how to plan and provide learning experiences to support individual children to make progress in all areas of their development.
- The childminder is aware of the importance of establishing positive relationships with parents and other professionals, and to share any observations and assessments that she undertakes.
- The childminder understands how to teach children about behaviour expectations, support their personal and social development, teach them to respect others, and promote healthy eating.
- The childminder understands the need to evaluate her service and bring about improvements. She has met the previous action and recommendations from her last inspection.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about her understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements, and the learning and development requirements.
- The inspector held discussions with the childminder about how she would assess children's learning and development, and work in partnership with parents and other professionals.
- The inspector looked at the areas of the childminder's house used for minding purposes, and a range of materials and equipment available to children.
- The inspector discussed the methods the childminder uses for self-evaluation. This included how the childminder has met the previous action and recommendations from her last inspection.

The childminder registered in 2010. She lives in the area of Old Ford, in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets. She operates Monday to Friday from 7.30am to 6.30pm, all year round, with the exception of public holidays.
