Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a confident knowledge of safeguarding. She understands the signs that may indicate a child's welfare is at risk and knows what to do if she has concerns. The childminder ensures her knowledge of safeguarding is up to date.
- The childminder understands the importance of completing assessments and monitoring children's progress. She describes how she will provide a suitable range of learning experiences to help children make good progress in their development.
- The childminder understands how young children learn and knows how to support their development. She recognises ways to monitor children's progress to close any gaps in their learning.
- The childminder recognises the value of working in partnership with parents and other professionals to help ensure consistency in children's care and learning.
- The childminder knows the importance of continuing her professional development to improve outcomes for children.
- The childminder recognises the importance of helping children to understand their own and others' behaviour and its consequences.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector had a tour of the premises and viewed all areas that are used when caring for children.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector discussed the childminder's methods for reviewing the quality and effectiveness of her provision.
- The inspector had a discussion with the childminder about her knowledge and understanding of the safeguarding and welfare requirements.
- The inspector looked at and discussed a range of records with the childminder, including policies and procedures, and evidence of qualifications.
