Summary of key findings for parents

The provision does not meet requirements

- Safeguarding is not effective. The childminder does not have an up-to-date paediatric first-aid qualification to enable her to care for an injured child. This is a breach of the Childcare Register.
- The childminder carries out regular risk assessments to ensure that children can play in a safe and secure environment.
- The childminder has a positive attitude to evaluation and values the views of parents and children to help her make changes to her setting.
- The childminder understands the value of working in partnership with parents and other settings children attend, to support consistency of care and promote learning.
- The childminder knows how to support children's move to school. She knows how to use observations to assess learning and make plans to help them make progress.
- The childminder recognises the importance of a healthy lifestyle. She discusses how she would encourage children to enjoy daily fresh air and exercise, for example, in the well-equipped and inviting garden.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What the setting needs to do to improve further

To meet the requirements of the early years foundation stage and the Childcare Register the provider must:

The childminder registered in 2010 and lives in Gravesend, Kent. The childminder offers her service from 7am to 6pm, Monday to Friday, all year round. The childminder receives funding to provide free early education for children aged two, three and four years. The childminder has a recognised early years qualification at level 3. At the time of inspection there were no children on roll in the early years age range.
