Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates a clear understanding of keeping children safe. She has a secure knowledge of safeguarding procedures and knows what to do and who to contact in the event of a concern. She assesses the risks which may arise in her home and on outings.
- The childminder has a good understanding of how children learn through play. She plans activities covering all areas of learning and understands the benefits of outdoor play for children.
- The childminder has effective ways to observe, assess and plan for children's learning. These include finding out from parents what children can do as they start, and planning for the next stage in children's learning.
- The childminder demonstrates a good understanding of how she will support children to settle. She explains how she uses information gathered from parents, to provide appropriate support for them when they first start in her care.
- The childminder has a good understanding of the importance of working in partnership with parents and other early years settings, to promote children's well-being.
- The childminder has a good understanding of helping children to lead a healthy lifestyle. Children are provided with healthy and nutritious meals and snacks and have access to fresh drinking water at all times.
- The childminder discusses her understanding of the importance of reflective practice and self-evaluation to drive improvements. The childminder has attended a variety of courses that extends her already good knowledge.
- The childminder has a good understanding of promoting children's good behaviour. She uses age-appropriate strategies and simple house rules, to help children learn about safe boundaries and develop their social skills.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she would deliver the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector looked at samples of relevant documentation the childminder uses.
- The inspector looked at the areas of the childminder's home available for minding children.
- The inspector discussed childcare practices with the childminder.
- The inspector checked evidence of the suitability of the childminder and other household members.

The childminder was registered in 2010 and lives in Clitheroe. She operates term time only from 7.15am to 9am and 3.30pm to 6pm on Monday to Friday. The childminder holds an appropriate childcare qualification at level 2.
