Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands her responsibilities in meeting the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage and other associated legislation.
- The childminder understands the importance of helping children learn skills they will need in readiness for when they move on to other settings and school. She was able to discuss how she will plan activities, which will take into account children's interests and current progress in learning.
- The childminder describes appropriate behaviour management techniques she intends to use to promote children's positive behaviour.
- The childminder knows how to provide children of differing ages, abilities and backgrounds with an appropriate range of resources and experiences to promote learning through play.
- The childminder knows the procedures to follow in the event of concerns about children's welfare. She understands how to safeguard and protect children from harm.
- The childminder recognises the need to continue training to improve her service. She knows the importance of self-evaluation and seeking parents' views to help her evaluate what she provides for children.
- The childminder understands how to promote a healthy lifestyle for children. She is aware of the importance of encouraging children to eat a nutritious diet and providing them with plenty of fresh air and exercise daily.
- The childminder is able to explain why working in partnerships with parents and other professionals will provide continuity in children's care and education.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to deliver the educational programmes for children.
- The inspector looked at policies and the documents the childminder will use when caring for children.
- The inspector and the childminder discussed how the childminder would safeguard children.
- The inspector discussed the process of self-evaluation, including establishing whether the childminder has addressed previous recommendations from the last inspection.
