Summary of key findings

This provision does not meet requirements

- The childminder does not hold valid public liability insurance. This breach is also related to the requirements under the Childcare Register.
- Through discussion, the childminder demonstrates she is aware of child protection issues, including indicators of extremist views and behaviours. She knows how to report any concerns to protect children from harm.
- The childminder describes the risk assessments that are in place to identify and address potential hazards in the setting. Appropriate toys and resources are available for children to access. Children will have opportunities to play outdoors to support their health and well-being.
- The childminder describes her understanding of how to observe and assess children's learning. She aims to use the information collected to plan the curriculum, to help children make progress.
- The childminder recognises the importance of collaborating with parents and other professionals. She aims to work alongside them to ensure consistency in children's care and education.
- The childminder discusses how she will form attachments with children to support their emotional well-being. She plans to establish behavioural rules to ensure children's safety.
- The childminder explains how she continues to promote her professional development. For example, since the last inspection, she has refreshed her knowledge of equality and diversity. The childminder plans to evaluate the quality of her services with input from parents and other professionals.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

What does the setting need to do to improve?
