Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder has a good understanding of her responsibilities to safeguard children and identify possible signs of abuse and neglect. She knows the relevant agencies to contact if she is concerned about a child's well-being or if an allegation is made against her.
- The childminder demonstrates an understanding of creating a safe and secure environment for children. She recognises the importance of carrying out thorough risk assessments. The childminder describes how she will identify any possible hazards in her home and when she takes children on outings.
- The childminder recognises the importance of working in partnership with parents and other professionals. She describes how she will share information about children's learning and development with their parents. Furthermore, the childminder explains how she develops good links with the local nursery and school and understands the importance of sharing relevant information with teachers. The childminder understands this helps ensure consistency in children's care and learning.
- The childminder explains how she will meet the learning needs, and interests of the different age groups of children. She discusses how she will use observation and assessments to effectively plan challenging activities that help children to make good progress.
- The childminder explains how she will build secure bonds with children to promote their independence and emotional well-being. For example, she describes how she will gain detailed information from parents to enable her to support children's individual care throughout the day.
- The childminder demonstrates, through discussion, how she intends to encourage children to adopt healthy lifestyles. For instance, through healthy eating, being physically active and spending time outdoors.
- The childminder describes how she will have high expectations for children's behaviour. She explains how she will help children to develop positive, caring relationships with others. She will encourage children to learn right from wrong and the consequences of their actions. The childminder understands the importance of an inclusive setting.
- The childminder describes how she will reflect on the quality of her practice to identify areas for further development. She explains how she keeps her knowledge and skills up to date. For example, she works alongside other settings to gain new ideas and attends relevant training.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
