Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder maintains a valid paediatric first-aid certificate and describes how she will treat children in medical emergencies.
- The childminder has valid public liability insurance to help ensure children's safety and to meet regulatory requirements.
- The childminder understands the procedures to follow and how to identify and report any concerns she may have about a child's welfare.
- The childminder has a secure understanding of effective behaviour management strategies and talks about how she will teach children to respect themselves and others.
- The childminder describes the benefits of working effectively with parents and others to promote best outcomes for children.
- The childminder shares how she will provide suitably challenging activities for children. She talks about how she will keep a regular check on children's development to help ensure they make good progress.
- The childminder describes how she will evaluate her practice and put clear goals in place to build ongoing improvements.
- The childminder talks about the benefits of giving children healthy experiences, such as daily physical activities and nutritionally well-balanced meals and snacks.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

- The inspector viewed the premises with the childminder.
- The inspector viewed some documentation, including evidence of suitability checks, and held a discussion with the childminder.
- The inspector discussed activities, children's assessments and how the childminder would support children's good progress.

The childminder registered in 2011 and lives in Teddington, in the London Borough of Richmond upon Thames. She operates all year round from 7am to 6.30pm, Monday to Friday, except for bank holidays. The childminder provides funded early years education for two-, three- and four-year-old children.

This inspection was carried out by Ofsted under sections 49 and 50 of the Childcare Act 2006 on the quality and standards of provision that is registered on the Early Years Register. The registered person must ensure that this provision complies with the statutory framework for children's learning, development and care, known as the early years foundation stage.
