Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates his understanding about how to keep the premises secure and safe for children. He knows that he must inform the Local Safeguarding Children Board about any concerns he may have about the welfare of a child.
- The childminder is aware of how to promote partnership working with parents and other providers that children attend, to support consistency in children's care and learning.
- The childminder has a clear understanding of how to support children to help them learn how to behave well and develop a positive attitude towards others.
- The childminder understands how he will promote children's awareness of leading a healthy lifestyle. He knows that children will benefit from having opportunities to play outside every day.
- The childminder recognises the benefits of evaluating his practice to make changes that will support children to be safe and make good progress in their learning and development.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how he will deliver the educational programmes for children, undertake observation and assessment, and plan for children's progress.
- The inspector discussed the policies and procedures with the childminder and viewed documentation that he will use when caring for children.
- The inspector had a tour of the areas of the premises that will be used by children. She spoke with the childminder about the equipment and toys available.
- The inspector discussed the safeguarding and welfare requirements with the childminder and took into consideration the suitability checks.

The childminder registered in 2011 and lives in Bexley, Kent. The childminder works with his wife who is also a registered childminder. He operates all year round, from 8am until 6pm on Monday to Friday, except bank holidays and family holidays. The childminder holds an appropriate qualification at level 3.
