Summary of key findings for parents

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands the importance of providing healthy snacks and meals to support children's individual dietary requirements. She discusses the importance of activities which support children's healthy lifestyles through exercise. For example, she plans to take tents and tunnels to the local parks.
- The childminder understands how to safeguard children. She knows what steps to take if she is concerned about a child. She plans risk assessments for off-site activities and plans to support children to understand how to manage risks.
- The childminder is aware and understands the early years foundation stage and knows ways to promote learning in young children. She plans to carry out regular observations and assessments to support children's learning and plan their next steps.
- The childminder understands the importance of evaluating her practice. She knows how to reflect on her strengths and weaknesses. For example, she refers to planned training to enhance her knowledge further.
- The childminder discusses partnership working with parents. She knows how to work with other settings and professionals. The childminder has systems in place to enable her to share information about children's care and learning with other settings they may attend.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed the safeguarding and welfare requirements with the childminder and checked evidence of the suitability of household members.
- The inspector discussed the range of activities and resources that the childminder intends to provide when caring for young children.
- The inspector had a tour of the premises to be used for childminding purposes and checked safety.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to evaluate the effectiveness of the service she provides to children.
- The inspector looked at a range of documents, and the forms the childminder intends to use for exchanging information with parents. This includes details about children's learning and development assessments.
