Summary of key findings for parents

The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands about child protection issues. She knows the signs that indicate a child may be at risk of harm. She knows the procedures to follow if she has any concerns about children's welfare.
- The childminder knows how to provide a safe environment for children to play. She, and her assistant, hold paediatric first-aid certificates.
- The childminder knows how to teach children about the importance of healthy lifestyles, such as through healthy eating and personal hygiene practices.
- The childminder know how to assess and monitor children's progress. She knows how to use this information to plan for children's future learning. The childminder knows how children learn and how activities and resources support children's learning.
- The childminder knows the importance of monitoring her assistant's performance and evaluating her provision to maintain the quality of teaching. She recognises the importance of keeping her professional knowledge and that of her assistant up to date, to help improve her provision and support outcomes for children.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

Inspection activities

- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she delivers the educational programmes when early years children are present.
- The inspector assessed the childminder's knowledge and understanding of the requirements.
- The inspector checked the evidence of suitability of all members of the household and childminder's training certificates, and discussed self-evaluation systems.
- The inspector looked at policies and documents that the childminder uses to plan and assess children's learning and development.
- The inspector looked at the space available for childminding and discussed the resources the childminder intends to provide.
