Summary of key findings

This provision meets requirements

- The childminder demonstrates effective understanding of her role and responsibilities to ensure children's safeguarding and well-being needs are met. She describes a number of signs that a child may be exposed to risks, such as exposure to extreme views and opinions.
- The childminder shows understanding of what children need to learn and how to support this for various age groups. Through discussions, she demonstrates effective understanding of child development and what she would do next to support children's learning and development.
- The childminder understands how to create a culture of respect and partnerships with the children and families she works with. She understands the importance of robust parent partnerships and how to involve them in their child's learning.
- The childminder demonstrates knowledge of the signs of radicalisation and how to manage such incidents. Through discussions, she understands how to monitor and act upon concerns effectively.
- The childminder attends regular training to keep her knowledge up to date. She understands the importance of this to ensure best outcomes for children.
- Through discussions, the childminder highlighted regular trips and outings to support children's community awareness.
- The childminder explains how she will use various strategies to help children develop an understanding of how to behave. For instance, she will use techniques such as taking children away from situations or distracting them, to support their learning.

There were no children in the early years age range present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no early years children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.
